- To know the character of the true Church of Jesus Christ as it is found among all peoples throughout the world.
- To know the mission of the Church in taking the Gospel to all people everywhere.

- To be able to teach, illustrate, and explain the orthodox doctrines, and to apply them in the context of
- To refute all heresies, innovations, and novelties that are fashioned by Satan and the imaginations of men.

Character:

- To be people of the Church.
- To love and devote our lives to the service of Christ's body, knowing that service for Christ is service to His Church.
- To love all the people of God as they are scattered throughout the whole world
- To rejection sectarianism, factionalism, and tribalism in the unity of the true Church.
- To be broad in their affections, without sectarianism and narrowness, being able to receive those who are weak in the faith, to nourish and build them up in the faith.

V. Research Paper

Write a 5000-word research paper on any topic related to the Doctrine of the Church and Last Things. All principles of good grammar, footnotes, and bibliography are required.

VI. Book Report

Submit a book report on *The Promise of the Future* by Cornelis Venema. Your report should be at least 1000 words in length and should include a summary of the contents of the book (75%) and an evaluation of Venema's argument (25%). No footnotes, bibliography, or outside resources are required.
